

DRESS CODE

Delegates will be asked to dress formally (western formal clothing) as they are representing their respective delegation.

Next we will give you a list of the dress code requirements for BEMUN (those who don't satisfy the dress code requirements like wearing jeans, informal pants, sandals or tennis shoes will not have access to sessions):

WOMEN

- Blouse w/ skirt (not too short!) that the chair allows
- Suit
- Dress
- Slacks w/ nice blouse
- Dress shoes (not open toed)
- Avoid lace and colored stockings
- No heavy perfume
- No costume jewelry

MEN

- Suit with tie (you should always wear your tie and button up your shirt, unless the chair allows it)
- Dress shoes (not tennis shoes)
- No jeans
- If you don't own a suit, assist to sessions as professionally as you could. Sweaters and long shirts are fine.

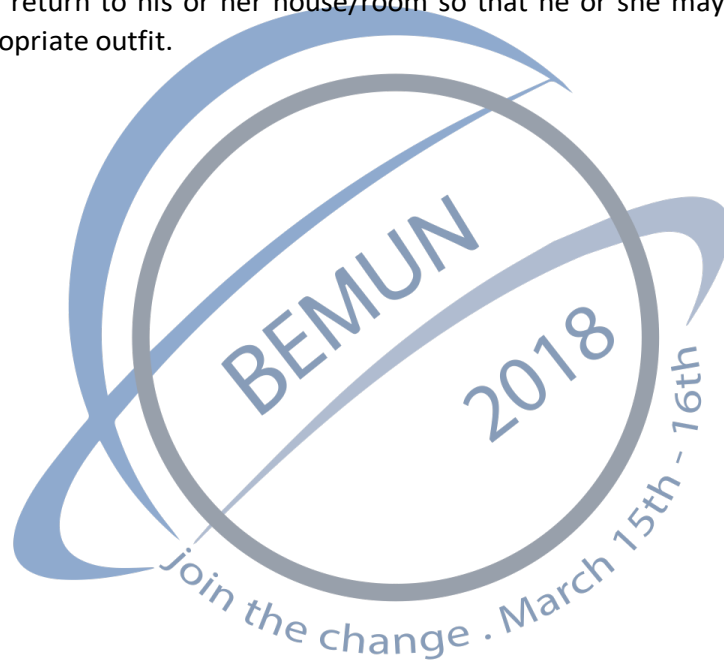
Bottom line: LOOK PROFESSIONAL.

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EXTRAS

- No sunglasses, hats or caps will be allowed during sessions. Delegates with such items will receive a warning and be asked to remove it.
- No gum; mints are acceptable
- Cell phones should not be seen or heard during the sessions. You may only use your phones at lunch or after the conference is over.
- Laptops are fine if they are used for writing resolutions or research, but you should not be using them to play games.

- No MP3 players, iPods, etc. (You are not at a MUN conference to listen to music...)
- During the event all delegates will be asked at all times to wear their ID.
- Keep hair looking professional at all times; hair style should not detract from your overall appearance.
- Delegates should not have piercings on the face (except for cultural purposes). It is required to remove rings or studs during the conference for a professional presentation.
- Any delegate whom the staff considers in violation of this policy will be asked to return to his or her house/room so that he or she may change into the appropriate outfit.



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
